### DOUGLAS MOORE BOWSER

31 March 1960 - 16 July 2022

Doug was born on 31 March 1960 in Bethesda, MD to Ruth and Paul Bowser. He has 3 older brothers, David, Jeff, and Ross; a younger half-brother, Matthew, and stepsister, Shellie. All of his sibilings join us today.

Paul (a Naval officer) and Ruth were both from Rhode Island and some of Doug's happiest childhood memories are of summers spent on the shore with his grandparents and family.

Unlike his brothers, Doug was not a sporty child, but he managed to start his entertainment career early by training as a puppeteer at the age of 10.

The family moved to Maitland, Florida when Doug was 8. Although Doug was proud of his Bethesda birthplace, he was moreor-less a native of Central Florida and was witness (and contributed) to the remarkable changes that have taken place to Orlando in the last 50 years.



He attended Dommerich Elementary, Maitland Junior High, and Winter Park High School from 1975 – 1978. It was at the latter where his remarkable talent to entertain became apparent, to the great amusement of his classmates, many of whom became lifelong friends and are here tonight.

Doug completed his education at University of Central Florida but, by then, it was clear that his interests and talents were not in academia!

Whilst still in High School, Doug worked on a seasonal basis at Walt Disney World, and it is here that his love of performing came to the fore, notably whilst causing havoc in the Tencennial Main Street Parade. He later worked as a mime at SeaWorld in the late-lamented Seal and Otter show.

Around the same time, Doug started frequenting the burgeoning gay scene of Central Florida and became a close friend of the talented actor, Paul Wegman ('Miss P' from the Parliament House), who was a great influence and mentor. This is when his love of pageants

(all kinds, straight, drag – he did not discriminate) started.

Doug's first professional stage appearance was on this very stage, at what was then the Civic Theater, playing the 'Scarecrow' in The Wizard of Oz. He also got his first review (a rave!) in the Orlando Sentinel.

Doug appeared in numerous theatrical productions during his 20s and entered into important artistic collaborations with Michael Wanzie (appearing together in the wonderfully titled *Vampire Lesbians of Sodom*) and David Lee and his Per4mAnts company (*Psycho Beach Party*). These appearances planted the seed which would later bloom into his most famous creation, 'Taffy Pinkerbox.'

It was during this time that Doug became a habitue of legendary downtown Orlando bar, Big Bang, run by the equally legendary (and much missed) Singhaus family; Sam, Marcy and Steve. All 3 were very influential on Doug's artistic development, with Marcy making many of his most memorable costumes.

Of course, rent has to be paid and food bought, so Doug also had a series of 'day' jobs, which he treated with varying degrees of seriousness, including a memorable stint working in the Reservations department of the airline, Florida Express, with his great friends Randall and Daniel. Later, he worked as a Tour Guide







for British tour operators, Thomson Holidays and Travel City Direct. This allowed him to work in Tunisia and England, and he developed a love for overseas travel.

But theater and entertaining were his great loves and he worked deceptively hard at his craft. To his eternal credit, he was eventually able to make a living from doing what he loved. He was an absolute legend of the area stage. He was revered by the actors he worked with, both in the "legitimate" theater and at attractions like Sleuths Mystery Dinner Shows, who knew him as a fearless performer who could make any bit better via his impeccable timing

and delivery. Even locals who never set foot inside a live-performance venue knew and loved him as one-half of the Wanzie and Doug movie-review team on Real Radio 104.1's 'The Philips Phile' for many years.

His theatrical appearances are too numerous to list and he will be best remembered for his wonderful comic performances in shows such as Wanzie's The Ladies of Eola Heights, The Most Fabulous Story Ever Told and, of course, Joan Crawford's Houseparty. However, he was also a superb actor in serious roles, notably in Thornton Wilder's Our Town, Larry Kramer's A Normal Heart and The Destiny of














Ironically, it was his 'side hustles' (bartending and hosting bingo/trivia) that helped create his most famous character. Taffy made her first appearance in the Fringe show, *Tired Old Whore*. But it was as a bingo host that the newly christened 'Taffy Pinkerbox' emerged in her full, vulgar, leopard-print glory. Taffy was a wonderful character, a creation of comic genius and 100% Doug.



Doug was taken from us far too soon when he had so much more to give. He was just about to embark on a tour with the hugely successful TVlandlive production of *The Golden Gals*. And who knows what else Taffy had up her batwing sleeve.

Doug is remembered by his family as always easy-going, gentle, funny and likable. He was a wonderful brother, brother-in law and uncle, and an even better son to his late mother, Ruth. He was loved by his family every day of his life.

His family and friends mourn him but take comfort in knowing that our lives are infinitely richer from having known him.

MAYA ANGELOU


When I think of death, and of late the idea has come with alarming frequency, I seem at peace with the idea that a day will dawn when I will no longer be among those living in this valley of strange humors.

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
















